### Chapter-2

## Jñāna: Knowledge

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sadā vaijātyam āptānām jīvānām api tattvatah amśatvenāpy abhinnatvād vijātīya-bhidā mṛtā

The jīvas (jīvānām api) always (sadā) have their own identities (tattvataḥ āptānām), different from that of the Supreme (vaijātyam). But they are parts of the Supreme (amśatvenāpy) and cannot exist separate from Him (abhinnatvād), and this rules out the difference called vijātīya (vijātīya-bhidā mṛtā).

This verse establishes the actual way that Brahman is advayam, free from all dualities.

The jīvas, it is true, belong to categories other than Brahman, such as the category of things that have finite size.

In that sense they are different from Brahman.

But in other respects they are nondifferent from Him: They are expansions of the same creative living force of which Brahman's own supreme personality consists, and they are His integral parts, naturally sharing many of His qualities.

Thus although they are individuals and eternally remain so, they are not entirely separate from the Absolute, Brahman, the Supreme Person
